Q & A

Q. What is the current industry practice: tracking accident repairs separately or as part of regular maintenance?

A. While many fleets account for their accident repairs as regular maintenance, it would appear that the trend is moving toward tracking the two separately. The advantage to this approach is that by knowing the true cost of maintenance, the fleet manager can make more informed life-cycle decisions including model comparisons and optimal trading cycles. In fleets that track the two separately, accident repairs are a part of the accident/claims/insurance line item for expense tracking purposes. They are not part of regular maintenance and repairs, and would only distort those expenses as they would not occur if not for the accident

The thinking is summed up by one fleet manager: "Tracking it together would skew our PM numbers horribly," he reports. To read more, please click here.

An Inside Look at Atrium Companies' Program

We are in an industry that fights for every driver, does not want to lose any driver, and in some cases will just about put anyone in the driver seat. Over the past decade hardly any carrier is "not guilty" of lowering their hiring standards in some form or fashion. Some because of turnover, some because of pay rates, and others because of poor equipment utilization. Even with the lower standards why would we not want to measure that individual's performance.

spend 80% of our time managing 20% of the driver staff. "A by product of this 80 / 20 rule is that generally speaking when a pay increase was needed for the drivers, it was always given to all the drivers regardless of level of performance," according to Jim Angel, CTP, Director of Fleet **Operations.** "This typical fleet offering tells the low performers that what they're doing is ok, and in turn tells the top performers that they are not appreciated any more or any less than everyone else. This does not allow a manager to improve the performance of his fleet as a group because it supports a middle of the

of the road approach."

Angel took that rule to heart. So about five years ago, he started measuring driver performance by mathematics. By taking company goals and building standards that require a driver to perform at a particular level to achieve the desired performance in six main categories:

- Hours of Service
- Safety
- Customer Service
- Job Knowledge
- MPG
