Q & A

Q. We are being challenged by some of our drivers about the setting of trucks at 62 when the legal speed limit is faster. They believe that the slower governed speed creates a safety hazard since our trucks can't "get out of the way." Do you have any research/data/ facts that we can use to refute their claims and/or suggestions for how they should handle such situations?

A. According to many fleets contacted, this type of feedback is typical. One fleet manager who implemented a 62 mph governed speed 10 years ago reported that his fleet had not experienced one rear-end collision or side-swipe in the 10 years since he implemented the program. He credited the slower speeds for improving reaction times.

"When you're driving at 62 mph, you're not driving with the rat pack and you're not making as many decisions," he said. "You're not in the thick of all the action."

Plus, he said, that from an equipment and maintenance standpoint, his equipment was lasting better because the slower speeds reduced wear and tear on the brakes, the clutch and the drive train. He urged such governed speed policies to be used in conjunction with onboard computers to monitor aggressive driving characteristics.

Also, from a fuel economy standpoint, for every 1 mph reduction in speed limit results in a 1/10th of a mpg savings in fuel savings. Many fleets allow their drivers to participate in the savings through incentive programs.

CTP Profile: 2009 Top Graduate ~ Amy M. Daley, CTP

"Since I was relatively new to transportation, I needed to build credibility with my role as the product manager." When Amy M. Daley was named Mobile Product Manager for J.J. Keller & Associates, she realized right away that she was going to have to increase her understanding of the private carriers that were among the target audience.

"We needed to gain a better understanding of all the changes that were going on in the world of our private fleet customer base," she said. "And for me personally, since I was relatively new to transportation, I needed to build credibility within my role as the product manager."

Earning her Certified Transportation Professional[®] designation seemed like the perfect way of those objectives.

However, drawing on her natural tenacity, disciplined preparation and her quiet competitiveness, Daley began her preparation by attending the Private Fleet Management Institute last January in Jacksonville

"I walked into that room on the first day and felt completely overwhelmed," she recalls. "I felt like the new kid on the block. It's difficult for somebody like me to walk into a room and have credibility, especially when you look around and see all the people who have been doing this their whole lives."

The experience helped whet Daley's appetite to ensure success on the

CTP Exam.

"Had I known how much work was involved," Daley said, "I would have started a lot sooner." But time was not on her side. She spent evenings and weekends in preparation, reading the course materials and writing practice case studies.

When the second Saturday in February arrived, she felt confident but says she has never been more scared in her life. So when the notice came that she had passed, she was never more relieved. "Being named the top graduate was just the icing on the cake."

PRIVATE FLEET ASSESSMENT PROGRAM

The Private Fleet Assessment Program, a web-based management resource designed to help private fleets on their journey to world class performance, has been launched by the National Private Truck Council (NPTC), Optima Associates, and Schneider National, Inc.

The new Private Fleet Assessment Program represents the next generation of the organization's annual benchmarking study.

The Private Fleet Assessment Program evaluates private fleet performance and targets improvement opportunities for private fleets in "Eight Pillars" of scoring: safety and fleet organization, network planning, customer management, fleet management, information management, driver management, continuous improvement and financial management.

Fleets navigating the program visit the Optima website, enter key operating information, and assess their performance against some 40 qualitative and quantitative attributes. Fleet performance is scored against world-class standards that were derived from hundreds of industry benchmarks and subject matter experts. Not only does the fleet receive a report comparing its performance to world-class standards, but it receives a set of detailed recommendations to help it improve performance.

In addition to identifying opportunities for improvement, this model can also provide a sliding scale of the impact of proposed changes-- the "what if" scenarios that have been too complex to thoroughly consider up until now.
