NPTC 2020 HAS BEEN CANCELED

Upon recommendation and approval of NPTC's treasurer and general counsel, the Executive Committee of the NPTC Board of Directors has canceled the NPTC 2020 Annual Conference and Exhibition due to the COVID-19 virus.

This decision is made in the best interest of the safety and welfare of all parties involved. It is also in response to the Governor of Ohio's State of Emergency orders recommending then prohibiting

that mass meetings scheduled in the state be canceled. The World Health Organization has declared the COVID-19 crisis officially a pandemic, and the U.S. government has banned travel from European Union countries into the United States. Many local and state jurisdictions around the country have issued orders recommending or requiring cancellations or limits on participation in all non-essential mass meetings.

NPTC MEETS WITH FMCSA OFFICIALS

Several weeks ago, NPTC President and CEO Gary Petty, Executive VP Tom Moore, and General Counsel Rick Schweitzer met with the entire senior staff of the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration, including Acting Administrator Jim Mullen, Chief Counsel Alan Hansen, Chief Safety Officer Jack Van Steenburg, Director of the Office of Policy Larry Minor, and Director of the Office of Enforcement Joe DeLorenzo.

FMCSA noted the website for its Drug and Alcohol Clearinghouse now includes information on how carriers must respond when they are unable to access the database due to technical issues:

On January 6, FMCSA posted a notice on the Clearinghouse home page that the system was experiencing technical issues, which made it difficult for employers to conduct pre-employment queries. These technical issues have been addressed. For those drivers who were hired without a pre-employment query, employers must now access the Clearinghouse to conduct pre-employment queries as required by §

382.701(1).

If the Clearinghouse experiences a recurrence of this issue, a notification will be placed on the home page informing employers that you may hire a driver using solely the procedures set forth in 49 CFR 391.23(e). If no such notification is on the home page, the requirement to conduct pre-employment queries prior to engaging a driver in safety-sensitive functions are in effect.

In addition, the agency indicated it was working on a final rule on driver hours of service, and discussed the difficulties in implementing an Item Response Theory system to replace the methodology in the Safety Management System of CRS. The officials were unable to provide any anticipated date for either the HOS rule or the IRT model going into effect, however.

NPTC provided information on the latest private fleet benchmarking survey and discussed adoption of vehicle safety technology, including speed limiters, as one means of addressing crash risk and higher liability insurance costs.

NPTC/J.J. KELLER FREE WEBCASTS

NPTC and J.J. Keller & Associates teamed up once again to host a series of safety compliance webcasts. The webcasts, which are free to all NPTC members, will begin next month and will focus on the following topics:

May 20: Using DataQs to challenge accident determination—In this webcast we will review what the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) considers an accident, how carriers are to record them, and the process of challenging the DOT classification of the accident via FMCSA's DataQs website.

May 21: Accident protocols— What do you need to do in the first critical hours after an accident, or in the weeks, months, and even years that follow?

July 15: Roadside inspections—This webcast will help reduce the stress and the mysteries when it comes to roadside inspections and help improve the outcomes when it comes to them.

July 16: How to survive a DOT safety audit—Discussed will be the different types of investigations conducted by FMCSA; how to prevent an audit; top violations discovered during audits; and steps necessary to be prepared for an audit.

October 14: Driver fatigue and hours of service—Hours-of-service regulations as they stand today and any official action that might be underway to change them will be discussed.

October 15: Medical qualifications for drivers— Driver qualification file requirements and updates to background materials used by medical examiners will be discussed.
