### NPTC WEBCASTS ON CUSTOMER SERVICE

ore than 100 people registered to attend the August 25 webcast on customer service sponsored by NPTC and J.J. Keller & Associates. The webcast, which was free for NPTC members, featured Erle Bergstrom, CTP, transportation manager of Orscheln Farm & Home. According to NPTC's 2010 benchmarking survey, customer service continues to be the overwhelming reason why companies operate a private truck fleet. In fact, 89% of the respondents report the primary reason for operating a private fleet is because it provides better customer service to key customers than is available using outside for-hire carriers. Attendees learned how to understand, define, measure, and translate this advantage. Orscheln shared how it strengthened its internal role by developing the analytics, tools, and resources and building a customer infused culture.

The next webcast, which will be held on October 20, will focus on driver recruiting and retention. Despite boasting a highly loyal workforce, private fleet professionals recognize they must continue to attract and retain the cream of the crop to maintain their competitive edge. This webcast will provide insight into how to accomplish the objective of acquiring the best talent by developing a keen and insightful understanding of the organization, its culture and its values, and matching that with candidates that reflect those same standards. ### **NATIONAL SAFETY CONFERENCE 2010**

A ccording to the 2010 Benchmarking Survey, NPTC members continued to improve their safety performance. Compared to the national average of 0.771 DOT reportable crashes per million miles, private fleets reported a lower rate of 0.513 crashes per million miles, a slight improvement from last year's figure of 0.55.

But that doesn't just happen. It takes a commitment to excellence. Effective training programs. Strong compliance. Precision record-keeping. And dedication to learning new strategies and best practices from best practices in the industry.

Just such an opportunity for peer-to-peer learning and exchange took place September 9-10 at the Dulles Hyatt in Herndon, Va., just outside of Washington, D.C., near Dulles International Airport. More than 170 fleet operations and safety managers from more than 50 transportation companies convened for NPTC's eighth annual National Safety Conference.

Through a unique format of presentations, discussions with key government representatives, workshops, expert panels, and networking opportunities, this year's program helped provide attendees, "Raise the Bar" on what is already an outstanding safety performance.

### 2010 BENCHMARKING SURVEY

**N** PTC is pleased to issue its 2010 Annual Benchmarking Survey, which examines a number of private fleet related issues and is designed to validate private fleet performance based on comparative peer data; to identify areas of improvement and opportunity; and to highlight significant trends affecting private fleet practitioners.

Working together with a Benchmarking Steering Committee, NPTC staff designed and updated a 60-question survey that was emailed to all NPTC Feet Member companies.

The survey period ran from February through June. Like last year's survey, the 2010 survey asked openended questions that encouraged respondents to answer in their own words. The information contained herein represents operating data for calendar year 2009. We are pleased to thank a total of 75 companies which participated in the survey.

Private fleets represent the largest sector of the trucking industry. Some 200,000 companies (not including farmers) operate private fleets in the U.S., as an extension of their primary business, according to FleetSeek. Some 60% of the survey respondents report that they expect their fleet to handle more freight over the next five years. In those cases, the average growth is estimated at 13%. For the 10% of respondents who indicated their fleets would contract (down by 45% from last year), the average size of shrinkage is estimated at 10%.

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The significant differences of fleets in the high growth category (as opposed to those in the contraction category) are summarized in the following table:

Accident Rate	0.379	0.52
Slip Seating	42.8	26.7
